



CONCEPT NOTE FOR FIELD TRIPS

Tuesday 31 January 2017

Rationale

Achieving universal health coverage (UHC) with the National Health Security Act in 2002 has enabled all Thai citizens to access to necessary health services as needed. However, accessing to necessary health service has been a key challenge to achieve the goal especially in people living in remote areas or having other socio-economic and/or health conditions that prevent them from reaching their needs.

After fifteen years of UHC implementation, efforts to improve accessibility to necessary health services, quality of health care, and financial protection for families have been introduced and implemented by related stakeholders, not only government agencies but also the non-government sector, civil societies and consumers. Evidences of these efforts include financial and non-financial interventions to promote the health status of vulnerable populations such as women and children, disabled people, the elderly, chronic disease patients, people living in rural areas, and other risk groups.

High impact interventions include benefit package for HIV/AIDS and risk groups, rehabilitation services and instruments for disabled people, vaccinations and other prevention and promotion services for high risk groups, and other health services for specific groups such as palliative care, long-term care, and alternative and Thai traditional medicines. Other related interventions to enable accessibility to UHC include setting up a collaboration process and system with the Ministry of Interior to expedite the birth registration process so children will be eligible to UHC, setting up a community health fund in the local community to promote civil society participation in health care, setting up an integrated claim and reimbursement system among the three main schemes to reduce redundant processes.

The Prince Mahidol Award Conference 2017 (PMAC 2017) will be organized under the theme “Addressing the Health of Vulnerable Populations for an Inclusive Society.” The PMAC 2017 field trip will be arranged to share experience in implementing health care initiatives to reduce barriers and enhance social inclusion of vulnerable populations in different settings and groups in UHC implementation. The concept notes of six site visits proposed for PMAC 2017 are described below:

Site 1.

Social and Health Support to Female Prisoners:

Insights from a Thailand Sample

Prison of Ratchaburi

Thailand is implementing the second National Plan of Action on the Treatment of Women Prisoners (2014-2017) in prisons and correctional facilities throughout the country. The Plan serves as a mechanism and guideline on the implementation of the United Nations Rules for the Treatment of Women Prisoners and Non-custodial Measures for Women Offenders or the ‘Bangkok Rules’. The Bangkok Rules is the initiative of Her Royal Highness Princess Bajrakitiyabha who has strong, personal commitment to the issue of improving the conditions and treatment of women in prisons, including through the establishment of the project on Enhancing Lives of Female Inmates (ELFI).

Women in prison require special attention not only because of their gender inequality but also their specific health needs. Many women in prison are mothers and usually are the primary or sole caregivers for their children and/or families. Some pregnant inmates require special care during and after delivery of their babies. The environment and health status of the inmates have been challenges in promoting their health status to meet the basic standard of life.

In November 2015, the Cabinet had approved to revise related laws on prisoners’ rights including their right to health care, and assigned the Ministry of Justice to be the main agency to improve the health service setting for prisoners by collaborating with other stakeholders including the Ministry of Labour, the Bureau of the Budget, the Office of the Council of State, the National Health Security Office, the Ministry of Public Health, the Medical Council, and the Nursing Council.

The site visit, Prison of Ratchaburi, will present how it is implementing to support developing a healthy environment, social assistance to promote quality of life of the female prisoners in female prisons.

Site 2.

Access to Health Care and Social Services for Older People in the Community

Khao Phra Ngam Municipality, Lopburi Province

Thailand is experiencing among the most rapid rates of population ageing in the developing world. This issue requires appropriate policies and programmes development to deal with. It is imperative that Thailand has a prepared National Policy and Programme on ageing as well as for long-term care services for older persons. The matter on policy direction is how we support the informal care system in order to keep the number of older population who need to be placed in an institution as low as possible. It also has to assure that family, relatives and communities are able to provide adequate care to their older people.

The home and community care under the Community Health Fund in the Universal Coverage Scheme (UCS) has been collaborated and co-financed between the National Health Security Office (NHSO) and the local government. The funding and administrative systems through this service aim to assist the older people to live independently in their homes, and to maintain or enhance their quality of life for as long as possible. A range of services may contribute to this aim including home nursing, day care, social outings, home visits and allied health (podiatry, physiotherapy, etc). Services are delivered through a range of sectors including public health, social services, and private for not-for-profit organizations such as health volunteers, care givers, etc.

Khao Phra Ngam Municipality has benefits for healthy older people and severe illness or frail elderly in the community. Home and community services programme is integrated care that has been defined as a discrete set of techniques and organizational models designed to create connectivity, alignment and collaboration within and between education, social protection, the cure and care sectors at community, the local administrative and/or provider levels. The care management or case coordination has been used as a collaborative process of assessment, planning, facilitation and advocacy for options and services to meet an individual's health needs, through communication and coordination of available resources, to promote quality cost effective outcomes. This site visit represents not only long-term care system for healthy older people and frail elderly but also social protection, social assistance and civil society engagement in the community healthcare system.

Site 3.

Collaboration to Develop Social Welfare and Health Care for Vulnerable Children

Phayathai Babies' Home

Thailand enhances child protection in the country in an effective and sustainable manner, through law enforcement and various protective mechanisms. The Child Protection Act 2003 intends to provide protection for children from all forms of abuses, exploitation, violence and gross negligence by clearly stipulating that any child below the age of 18 is protected by the state. The Act has established the Child Protection Fund by allocating an annual budget to be used for providing welfare assistance to children and their families, centres for the protection of child rights and families and also provision of welfare, rehabilitation geared to child development at welfare centres and children and family shelters, with the objectives of rehabilitation, capacity building and preparation of life as productive members of society. The most critical cognitive development of Social Work and Social Welfare Services for Children begins at a very young age and the first five years of life are particularly important to ensure that children can reach their full potential.

Phayathai Babies' Home was the first agency that was set up to provide services for good social development and welfare in boys and girls from new born to 5 years old. Many of these children are orphans while some are abandoned, or street children, or affected by HIV/AIDS, abused or caught in the middle of court custody situations. Some are there because their parents are unable to care for them due to abject poverty, socially unfit or serving time in prison. The home was supported and collaborated to develop and provide social welfare and health care including basic necessities, nursing care, health care service, child development and social welfare service, such as close physical contact for physical and mental development, education, family tracing, foster parents, etc.

This site visit will show the strong and close collaboration between various government units, private organizations and NGOs to develop social welfare and health care for vulnerable children such as birth registration, immunization of children, child health, child nutrition, access to schooling, protection of violence against children, as well as access to water and sanitation.

Site 4.

Holistic and Humanized Care for HIV/AIDS

Bamrasnaradura Infectious Diseases Institute

The National Health Security Office (NHSO) together with the Ministry of Public Health, networks of academicians, people living with HIV (PLHIV) and civil society organisations (CSO) has consistently worked together on the policy mobilisation for the health security of people living with HIV and AIDS and to assure that everybody in Thailand has equitable access to the quality HIV services and antiretroviral therapy (ART) services since 2006.

HIV services especially antiretroviral therapy (ART) services brought back healthy, meaningful and productive lives to PLHIV and AIDS patients who had lived without hope in the past. It energises HIV positive people with confidence, pride and dignity. Trials and errors experienced by PLHIV has turned into the key advocacy strategy and leaped forward the universal access to ART programme in Thailand (2006 – present). Lastly, in June 2016, Thailand received validation from the World Health Organization (WHO) for having eliminated mother-to-child transmission of HIV, becoming the first country in Asia and the Pacific region and also the first with a large HIV epidemic to ensure an AIDS-free generation.

Bamrasnaradura Infectious Disease Institute (BIDI) was founded in 1960 to serve as an infectious disease hospital providing health services, infection control, training and research. BIDI has taken care of HIV/AIDS patients. AIDS and its associated opportunistic infections (OI) are the major infectious diseases that BIDI has to provide various services for HIV/AIDS patients such as counselling, laboratory diagnosis and monitoring, health promotion, OI in HIV-infected management, antiretroviral therapy (ART), prevention of mother-to-child transmission (PMTCT) programmes, and post exposure prophylaxis.

BIDI has a policy to strengthen and promote holistic, humanized and patient-centred care. As HIV/AIDS patient is a major client in BIDI, the unique character of HIV/AIDS treatment and care was provided in every clinic. BIDI doesn't have HIV or ARV clinic and all patients are blinded to each other about their HIV status. All medical doctors and paediatricians are HIV specialists. BIDI has skills for diagnosing common opportunistic infectious disease by using simple and rapid method. There is one stop service at TB clinic and ANC. Several techniques were developed such as no touch technique in the operating theater to avoid injury in health care workers from sharp objects during operation,

intraocular injection for CMV retinitis and spinal drainage for cryptococcal meningitis who have intractable increased intracranial pressure. Although these procedures are not the treatment's gold standard but they are suitable for the resource limited countries like Thailand. Patient-centred care is promoted through performing cervical pap smear for cervical cancer screening at medical OPD by trained nurses there because it is more convenient for female clients and reduces their number of hospital visits. The other services include various types of counselling, health promotion in hospital setting, palliative care, the integrated services between various departments and also successful PMTCT program and PEP, post exposure prophylaxis program for BIDI's health care workers. The participants will realize in this site visit what is holistic and humanized care for HIV/AIDS and how to manage to achieve it.

Empowerment and Promote Quality of Life for People with Disabilities

The Redemptorist Foundation, Chonburi Province

In Thailand, there are mechanisms and policies not only from different ministries but also other non-government agencies to support and promote quality of life for people with disabilities. In the Universal Coverage Scheme (UCS), people with disabilities have a privilege over other beneficiaries in that they can access to any health facility at their convenience. There are also benefit packages on rehabilitation and aid instruments for people with disabilities. Tax incentives and other investment benefits have been provided for hiring persons with disabilities.

The Redemptorist Foundation for Developmental Disabilities has been established to promote quality of life for people with disabilities by enabling them to earn income from knowledge and skills they learned from the Redemptorist Vocational School. Disability law compliance has also been monitored by the foundation for the right protection of persons with disabilities. Related research and knowledge collection about persons with disabilities have also been done by the foundation. A network of collaboration among other government and non-government agencies as well as the school alumni and volunteers is a key to promote sustainable activities for people with disabilities. The school alumni members have a strong network. They work together to promote empowerment and sustainable activities to be able to have independent living for their members and quality of life. The study visit will present how they educate, empower, provide and support activities such as vocational training for young adults with disabilities and developing their skills and knowledge to ensure an independent life, support, therapy and education to promote well-being and a better standard of living for children with special needs and their family and offering support, training and counseling to people with disabilities in their search for suitable employment and a place in society and lastly the activities of related networks.

Site 6.

Services for People with Disabilities:

Moving Beyond Rehabilitation

Siriraj Hospital, Mahidol University

Social exclusion consists of multiple paradigms that resulted from the initial inequalities, where certain groups of the population are directly/indirectly denied the access to vital resources/services that profoundly impact the state of their well-being. Among the growing concerns of social exclusion, the population with disability continued to face imminent challenges in gaining acknowledgements within the strata of social developments including healthcare services, education, employment and social policies

Besides disability, incurable and end-of-life patients are another vulnerable group often excluded from care. Before, these patients were discharged and abandoned from modern health system. They often seek support based on their beliefs, cultures, and available resources. Palliative care is an important approach providing holistic and humanistic care with compassion, meeting the physical, emotional, psychological, and spiritual needs of each patient and the family.

The Faculty of Medicine Siriraj Hospital, Mahidol University has been actively engaged in resolving this particular context of social exclusion. A number of implemented policies within the healthcare settings of Mahidol University demonstrate an upheaval in terms of physical accessibilities and healthcare services. This site visit will show the following activities which are the direct responses toward the impending difficulties such as

- The holistic intensive rehabilitation program was provided for children and adults with disabilities under the Department of Rehabilitation Medicine.
- Sirindhorn School of Prosthetics and Orthotics (SSPO) under HRH Princess Sirindhorn's gracious support developed national and hybrid international courses in Bachelor of Prosthetics and Orthotics (B.PO.) in South East Asia.
- A palliative care service was developed to improve the quality of life of patients and their families facing the problem associated with life-threatening illness. A multi-disciplinary team including medical personnel, caregivers, and volunteers is devoted to provide high quality care, necessary services and support to meet the needs of each patient.
- Siriraj Bimuksthan Museum was established to provide an opportunity for people with disabilities to explore the valuable history of the area at the mouth of Bangkok Noi canal – Wang Lang using the modern techniques presentation.

These preceded responses are the products of year-long culmination in routine & research practices. While most of them have been progressing with a high turn-over rate of satisfaction, our goal here at Siriraj Hospital is to bridge the gap of social inequalities by making such innovations publicly available and affordable for all members of society.
